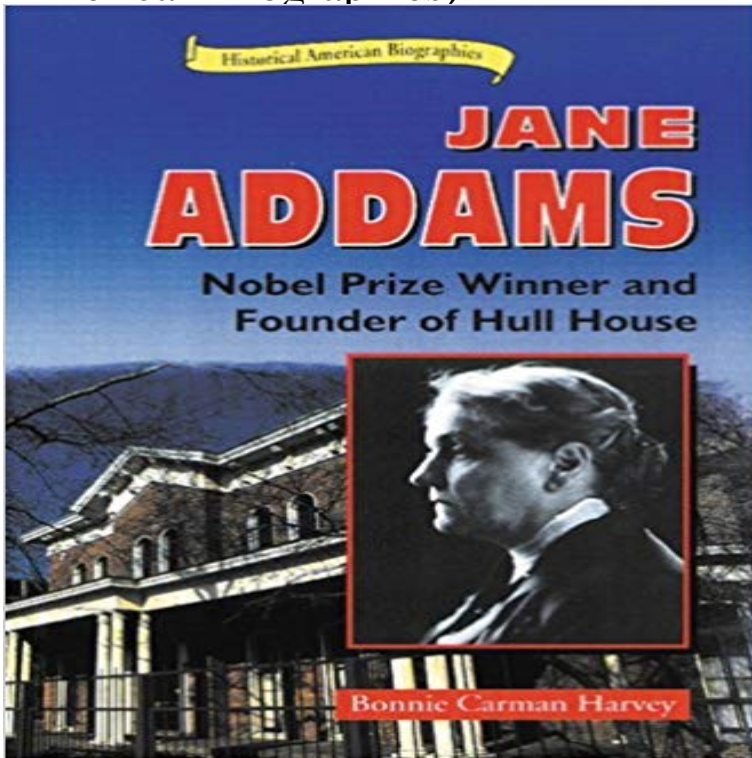


Jane Addams: Nobel Prize Winner and Founder of Hull House (Historical American Biographies)
